0.3_KNIT STITCH

Knit stitch is the most basic element you need to acknowledge to be able to start knitting.

But let's begin slowly: used alone, the knit stitch will create the garter stitch, a series of waves on your knitted fabric.

On the other hand, combined with the purl stitch, the knit stitch can create almost everything, from the simple stockinette stitch, seen as a series of "V", to all kinds of ribs, seed stitches and many others.

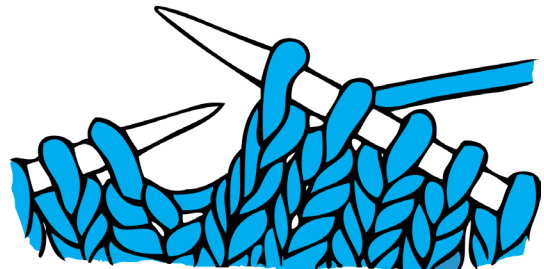
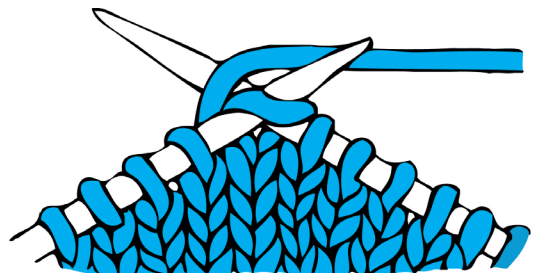
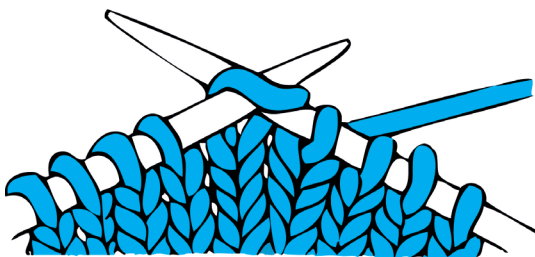
1. After the cast on, insert the right needle into the first stitch from underneath and upwards.
2. Pull the yarn around the right needle clockwise (yarn over) and carry it towards you, under the stitch on your left needle.
3. Move towards the end of the left needle and let the first stitch slip on the right needle.

There you go! Be sure to count the stitches at the end of every row to check if you have missed or increased some.
